Message from the Executive Director

Looking back over this past year, we have had so many memorable events to capture in this report. In June 2019, the place Durham Deaf Services (DDS) called home for so many years was sold. Although it was a very difficult decision to sell 750 King St E, the cost to bring the building up to code would have created financial hardships.

Following the sale, as we prepared to move our office, came months of sifting through years of files and records. Throughout the summer of 2019, we were fortunate to have so many volunteers and students assisting DDS in backing up documents for safe storage. We organized and scanned hundreds of photographs that brought back so many great memories. In January 2020, we invited the Deaf Community, past employees, community partners, past Board Members, and Executive Directors to an evening celebrating our time at this historical building. It was a tremendously successful evening with over 70 people in attendance.

This past year we continued to strengthen our partnerships. We are truly grateful for our partnerships which have allowed DDS to have a stronger voice when advocating to remove the barriers that unfortunately still exist in our community.

Durham Deaf Services was delighted to be part of the historical passing of Bill C-81, also known as the Accessible Canada Act. In June 2019, the House of Commons approved Bill C-81 and the passing of this bill is a huge step forward for our community. The passing not only underlines Canada's recognition of the rights of individuals with disabilities but also represents a genuine commitment to working towards equity of opportunity. We are grateful to the Canadian Association of the Deaf and to their partner agencies for their tremendous work in getting ASL, LSQ, and ISL into the amendments to the proposed Bill C-81 (Accessible Canada Act). Durham Deaf Services, CAD, ARCH, CHS, BRCD, OAD, DLI, and Silent Voice came together on June 19 to celebrate this momentous occasion! DDS was honoured to be part of this amazing network and we are very proud of all of our accomplishments this year.

On February 28, 2020, Durham Deaf Services moved to our new location at 900 King St E, a place we now call home. DDS was truly fortunate that we moved just before the COVID-19 pandemic. As a result of COVID, we have designed a plan to have staff work from home and to continue to offer programs and services to the best of our ability.

DDS is grateful for our strong partnership with the Durham Deaf Club (DDC) and the Oshawa Deaf Senior Citizens (ODSC). Both groups are great supporters of DDS and offer financial support as well as volunteering to assist the agency in so many ways.

We are also grateful to Jennine Agnew-Kata from the Literacy Network of Durham Region (LiNDR) for her support and assistance in the promotion of literacy and basic skills within the Durham Region. DDS is proud to be a part of LiNDR and this amazing group of professional leaders in our community who work collectively to provide the best literacy services in the Durham Region.

We would like to acknowledge and express our gratitude to the Oshawa Senior Citizen Centre for providing space to the Deaf Seniors to meet for social gatherings.



<u>Deaf Adult Upgrading Program (DAUP)</u>

Our 2019-2020 year was busy and successful, and a uniquely different year than we have had in the past. We moved into our new location at the end of February and before we knew it COVID-19 hit. We closed our office for the safety of our staff, learners, and community members. Despite being closed at the moment, we are still working hard to deliver services.

This year we offered a partnership with George Brown College for resumes and cover letters. We also conducted workshops such as fraud and scams with the Durham Regional Police and brought in other Deaf individuals such as Tristan Kong, a Deaf realtor, to educate our Deaf learners and the community at large about the real estate market.

The learner's Social Enterprise project was a success at the Harmony Creek Market this past November which gave the learners an authentic location to sell their beautiful artwork. The learners even took on DIY renovation projects for our new office. We saw such pride and teamwork from our literacy program with volunteers coming daily to make our new office home. So much was gained in terms of community and learning. A pragmatic approach to learning is what we always try to achieve and this year we were more than successful.

We are still accepting new registrations for our upcoming year. New Deaf, hard of hearing, and oral deaf learners are welcome, at any time, to enroll in our literacy program. Come by and see for yourself our new office and the classes that we are offering when we reopen to the public.
